


After the talk Mr. Raplee showed a wonder-ful movie about the U.S Flag, giving its his -tory.







The problem of costumes was solved with cotton wigs, black pa-per hats and paper doilies made excellent lace ruffles.


Sets were made with the help of Ronnie Morelli and James Follenzo. Mike Mann and Carl Warhurst were the chief staplers of paper hats.
